that of a prospective merger partner? (Note: this tends to ease the issue of negotiating	
the leadership position.)	
Are our board-management relationships strong? Is genuine trust, respect, and support	
mutually evident?	
Can our leaders speak with one voice? Can we move into a negotiating scenario	
presenting a unified position?	
Has our organization successfully taken risks before? What is our organization's	
tolerance for risk?	
Do we have a track record of growth? Does our organization welcome growth? Can our	
systems easily expand to accommodate growth?	
Does our leadership have a high tolerance for working through ambiguity and patience	
for an unpredictable process?
